Judge Shaffer called the regular Gilliam County Court meeting to order at 10:00 am. The meeting was held at the Gilliam County Courthouse, Courtroom located at 221 S. Oregon St. Condon, OR. Court members present were: Judge Steve Shaffer, Commissioner Dennis Gronquist and Commissioner Michael Weimar. Absent: None

IN THE MATTER OF CONSENT AGENDA: DECEMBER 17, 2014 MINUTES AND JANUARY 7, 2015 MINUTES

Motion by Commissioner Gronquist, seconded by Commissioner Weimar to approve consent agenda including December 17, 2014 and January 7, 2015 minutes. Shaffer – Yes; Gronquist – Yes; Weimar – Yes; **Motion carried.**

IN THE MATTER OF ADDITIONS TO AGENDA

4.2.5 – North Central Public Health District update

IN THE MATTER OF ARLINGTON TV COOPERATIVE: FIBER PROJECT DISCUSSION AND USDA GRANT MATCH REQUIREMENT/REQUEST

Alan Cunningham and John Neys Arlington TV Cooperative representatives were present to continue discussion on fiber project and request grant match funds for USDA grant. Cunningham explained the Arlington TV Cooperative has an opportunity to apply to USDA for approximately an \$800,000 grant that would fund the HUB at Arlington and connectivity to vital community services. The grant deadline is February 17, 2015. Cunningham asked the Court to consider providing the matching funds in the amount of \$150,000. Port of Arlington Manager/Economic Development Officer, Peter Mitchell is assisting with the grant application. Joe Bradley with USDA is encouraging the cooperative to apply to this specific grant. Cunningham explained the grant will cover only a portion of the fiber project. Cunningham stated the TV Cooperative is requesting a one time commitment in the amount of one million from the County; if the grant is successful the \$150,000 would be deducted from the one million. The total project cost is \$1.9 million. It was reported a condition of being awarded the USDA grant is identified vital community service entities will receive services for free for two years. It was explained the USDA grant would fund phase one of the project it will not provide funding to provide residential services, cable or phone.

Judge Shaffer voiced his concern in the potential for duplication of efforts as Frontier Telenet's goal is to supply high speed internet to vital services and the County already has a large financial investment in that system. Judge Shaffer commented in reviewing the business plan he is concerned with the projections being realistic. Cunningham and Neys defended the projections. Cunningham pointed out fiber is needed for cable upgrades as at this time cable can only be run on fiber, wireless is not an option. Cunningham pointed out the business plan includes two full time employees from the onset and the HUB is to be built next to the fire hall at Arlington. Discussion took place on Windwave's fiber connection to the mental health office at Arlington. It was noted the fiber to the mental health office was funded by Greater Oregon Behavioral Health Inc. (GOBHI).

In response to Commissioner Gronquist question Cunningham said Frontier Telenet is in the whole sale business and Arlington TV Cooperative is on the retail business side. The entities have two different roles however there is some concern of duplication with the providing to internet to vital community services. It was further explained Arlington TV Cooperative will need to purchase bandwidth from an entity, i.e. Frontier Telenet so the entities will work together most likely.

Judge Shaffer commented the Court will be discussing budget matters this afternoon and will be in a better position to provide an answer on the \$150,000 grant match request after that discussion. In response to Judge Shaffer, Cunningham stated he is not sure on the timeline in which the one million would be needed. In response to Commissioner Gronquist question Cunningham stated the TV Cooperative should know the status of the grant in 30-60 days after submission. Judge Shaffer commented he is in favor of \$150,000 grant match at this time with the remainder of the request to be discussed. Judge Shaffer commented he believes a priority for the County should be fiber access for the citizens to allow competitiveness. Cunningham was told the Court will make a decision on the \$150,000 grant match this afternoon.

IN THE MATTER OF GILLIAM COUNTY LIBRARY BOARD MEMBERS: LIBRARY REPORT

Gilliam County Library Board members Kim Farrar and Dawn Parm were present to provide an update to the Court. Farrar began by thanking the Court for continued support and expressed a desire to meet with the Court on a regular basis and not just at budget time. Farrar shared the following with the Court.

- New library building is attracting increased patronage
- In 2014 the library had 6,595 patrons (1633 accessed the computers)
- The library averages daily 27 patrons and the library is open to the public five hours a day five days a week.
- Circulation which includes books, tapes, magazines etc. for 2014 was at 6,464 items.
- Library receives weekly visits from the Condon sixth grade and Condon High school English classes. High School science class has also been a patron.
- Library hosts a preschool story time twice a month and Condon Child Care participates along with community members.
- Hosted events have included an Appreciation Tea, July 4th Book Sale, summer youth reading program which included performances from Charlie Brown the Juggler & Brian Waite Band, Story walk in October (health and literacy), Traveling Lantern Theatre production of Ben Franklin and co-sponsored with Gilliam County Historical Society and Cultural Coalition Cowboy Poet Jessica Hedges and with co-sponsored with Books and More Reading Group author Yvonne Pepin-Wakefield (Suitcase full of Nails).
- Library hours are Monday-Friday 12:30 to 5:30 and it can be challenging for the library manager to get everything done, looking into proactive ways to help with the situation.
- Youth Librarian has given her notice with her last day to be February 27, 2015 the Library Board will be discussing this matter at its next meeting and Farrar will contact Leanne Durfey about hiring protocol.

Farrar commented the Library receives a lot of good feedback from Hotel Condon patrons that are amazed at the library for the size of community and county. Judge Shaffer suggested the Library provide semi-annual reports and thanked Farrar for the great information. Farrar again thanked the Court for supporting the Library and commented as the County begins its budget process to remember the positive contributions the Library makes to the citizenry. Farrar concluded with a quote by American novelist Sidney Shelton "Libraries store the energy that fuels the imagination. They open up windows to the world and inspire us to explore and achieve, and contribute to improving our quality of life. Libraries change lives for the better."

IN THE MATTER OF NCPHD UPDATE

Judge Shaffer stated he received email correspondence this morning from Wasco County that they indeed are leaving the North Central Public Health District (NCPHD) and have given the appropriate notice to Oregon Health Authority that Wasco County is withdrawing from the health district with end date December 31, 2015. Judge Shaffer commented the intergovernmental

agreement states that a member must give 180 day notice of their intent to withdraw and that their financial obligation is to end at the end of a fiscal year in this case either June 30, 2015 or June 30, 2016. Wasco County has expressed a desire to end financial contract June 30, 2015 and then would like to contract with NCPHD for the next six months through the end of calendar year 2015.

Discussion took place with lots of unanswered questions at this time including will NCPHD be viable without Wasco County funding? Will NCPHD be able to support staff and services? Can public health be provided locally? Commissioner Gronquist commented he is not in favor of contracting with Wasco County for six months.

In response to Commissioner Gronquist inquiry Court Administrator Leanne Durfey explained at one point in time Gilliam County was the only County without a public health district in which the state contracted services out on behalf of the County then in approximately 2006 Wasco County approached the County about providing environmental health services at no cost, which then lead to Wasco County requesting payment for environmental health services, which eventually lead to the creation of NCPHD, a three county health district (Wasco, Sherman and Gilliam). Judge Shaffer explained Wheeler County provides some components of public health out of its local health clinics and contracts with Grant County for other public health services. In response to Commissioner Weimar's question about funding for public health, Gilliam County's annual contribution to NCPHD is approximately \$90,000.

It was suggested to have the two clinics in Gilliam County work together and determine what they can offer locally with respect to public health and to begin discussions with the State of Oregon. South Gilliam County Health Center Director Hollie Winslow (member of audience) stated she would be willing to look at the services provided by NCPHD to assess if they can be offered locally and would be willing to contact Dave Anderson at the clinic in Arlington. Judge Shaffer stated the County is obligated to NCPHD financially through June 30, 2016 so there is time to figure out a solution.

Member of the audience Sheriff Bettencourt commented as a Community Counseling Solutions (CCS) Board member Grant County contracts with CCS for public health services and knows it has been a financial difficulty that has ended up with Grant County contributing more. Sheriff Bettencourt commented as a representative of South Gilliam Health Board he is in favor of the county looking into providing public health services itself. Member of the audience Kathryn Greiner commented she served on the NCPHD Board and is in favor of this direction and feels the local approach is a good approach.

IN THE MATTER OF OSTER PROFESSIONAL GROUP AUDIT REPORT FOR FISCAL YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 2014

Treasurer Nathan Hammer distributed copies of audit report for fiscal year ending June 30, 2014 to members of the court. Hammer referred to copy of exit conference/letter. The letter highlights findings and recommendations including issues in which Oregon local budget law was not followed and strong recommendation for County personnel to attend training related to Oregon Local Budget Law (which Hammer indicated he plans to attend) and concern with Fair Board doing its own accounting, a repeated concern. It was noted the Fair Board is audited separately and has been provided a copy of their audit report. Commissioner Weimar suggested reviewing state statutes to determine if the County can take over the accounting. It is the position of the auditors that the County Court has the authority to make a fiscal change. There were no other significant reporting issues noted by the accountants in the other areas tested.

Judge Shaffer commented in conversations with the auditors about the accounting system being used they believe the system is an old and outdated system. Judge Shaffer encouraged Hammer in the future to look at different software that may be more applicable. In response to

Commissioner Weimar the Clerk's Office and Road Department Administrative Assistant use the system for accounts payable. Hammer commented he is adaptable and if everyone else is fine with the system he is okay, noting the tax collector does not use this system the tax information has to be manually transferred into the system. Hammer stated a more automated system would allow for less possible manual errors as the current system relies heavily on manual entry of data. Hammer was thanked for his time.

IN THE MATTER OF VETERANS SERVICE OFFICER BRYAN HUNT: SEMI-ANNUAL REPORT

Tri-County Veterans Service Officer Bryan Hunt reviewed quarterly report for second quarter of fiscal year 2015. Hunt highlighted Gilliam County statistics including no new claims, six granted, 10 medical filed, and recovery of zero. Hunt explained there is a computer tracking issue with Oregon Department of Veterans Affairs and the issue is being worked on however attributes to the zero recovery figure. Reported the new software is intended to be more seamless between Oregon Department of Veterans Affairs and Veterans Affairs. In response to Judge Shaffer Hunt commented he is reaching about one-third of the Veterans in the County and there is a population that does not need services and he is working on finding those Veterans that do need services. Hunt was thanked for his report.

IN THE MATTER OF CORRESPONDENCE

Acknowledged letter from Michelle Colby resigning from the Planning Commission as she will begin a new role as County Planning Director.

Motion by Commissioner Weimar, seconded by Commissioner Gronquist to accept letter of resignation by Michelle Colby from the Gilliam County Planning Commission. Shaffer – Yes; Gronquist – Yes; Weimar – Yes; **Motion carried.**

The vacancy on the Planning Commission will need to be filled.

IN THE MATTER OF COLUMBIA BASIN GENERAL MANAGER: RE: FUTURE SIP AGREEMENTS

Columbia Basin General Manager Tom Wolff referred to letter sent to the Court requesting for specific language to be included in all future strategic investment program agreements (SIP). Wolff commented the request is to replace and/or supersede any previous language that may have been approved by the Court. To the recollection of the Court no such language request has been previously approved. Judge Shaffer informed Wolff that a copy of the letter has been sent to County legal counsel for advisement as previously the Court has been challenged over language pertaining to buy/hire local requirement in SIP agreements. Wolff expressed his position for the request and Columbia Basin Electric Cooperative (CBEC) believes this specific language is necessary to protect the integrity of the CBEC service territory. Wolff commented CBEC is challenging this matter currently and will keep the County updated. Wolff thanked the Court and asked the Court to consider the language at a future date. The Court thanked Wolff and again expressed need to defer taking action on request until legal counsel opinion is received.

IN THE MATTER OF AGREEMENT NO. 150508 WITH OREGON JUDICIAL DEPT. FOR COURTHOUSE FIRE PROTECTION SYSTEMS UPGRADE PROJECT

It was reported county counsel has review the agreement, no changes recommended.

Motion by Commissioner Gronquist, seconded by Commissioner Weimar to accept agreement No. 150508 with Oregon Judicial Department for courthouse fire protection systems upgrade. Shaffer – Yes; Gronquist – Yes; Weimar – Yes; **Motion carried.**

IN THE MATTER OF EASTERN OREGON COUNTIES ALLIANCE WORK PLAN AND DUES

Judge Shaffer commented in reviewing the Eastern Oregon Counties Alliance work plan and dues structure he is concerned with the dues as outlined and return on investment as the due payments go towards lobbying efforts at Washington DC and believes the County has a good relationship with our congressional delegation. Discussion took place. It was noted Wheeler County did not participate last year and it is questionable that Sherman County will participate this year.

Motion by Commissioner Weimar, seconded by Commissioner Gronquist to decline joining the Eastern Oregon Counties Alliance at this time. Shaffer – Yes; Gronquist – Yes; Weimar – Yes; **Motion carried.**

IN THE MATTER OF TOWN HALL ANNOUNCEMENT

U.S. Representative Greg Walden will hold a town hall this Friday January 23, 2015 at 2:30 p.m. at the Anderson Building on Condon's Main Street. Commissioner Weimar asked that his concern with Bureau of Land Management purchasing land and adversely impacting the County be conveyed as he will be unable to attend the town hall.

LUNCH the County Court recessed for lunch at 12:00 p.m. and reconvened at 1:00 p.m.

IN THE MATTER OF GILLIAM COUNTY GRAIN LAB PROPOSAL BY DENNIS MITCHELL

Doctor Dennis Mitchell distributed copies of his transition proposal for the Gilliam County Grain Laboratory. Dr. Mitchell provided a summary of his professional background including holding a BS, MS and Ph.D. degrees in Analytical Chemistry. Dr. Mitchell expressed a desire in operating the laboratory, expanding services and eventually privatizing the lab. Dr. Mitchell highlighted his transition proposal including phase one - transition plan for the first year and phase two – growing the business encompassing year two through five. Dr. Mitchell outlined the County's role during the five years including provide current facilities, annual operating funding in the amount of \$99,000, provide lab technician for first year and option to exclusively extend the arrangement an additional five years. Dr. Mitchell identified new potential sources of revenue for laboratory including analytical, consulting, and research and development. Dr. Mitchell commented his proposal is a pathway to transition the lab from a public entity to a private facility while maintaining the County's obligation to USDA for the facility. Judge Shaffer commented in the Court's consideration of closing the lab it would provide a cost savings to the County. Dr. Mitchell stated for example the County's buy-out obligation to USDA is approximately \$500,000 than he is asking the County to consider spreading that amount over a five year period with the hope of sustaining lab; contributing to future economic development and employee growth in the County. In response to Judge Shaffer Dr. Mitchell commented yes, the proposal is negotiable. Commissioner Gronquist stated he has held a conversation previously with Port of Arlington Manager/Economic Development Office Peter Mitchell and Dr. Mitchell and was upfront that the County's consideration of closing the lab would be a cost savings to the County and is in favor of closing the lab and saving the County money. The proposal presented would not save the County any funds. In response to question Dr. Mitchell commented he is currently working, doing consulting services and if the opportunity presented itself could start immediately at the lab. Commissioner Gronquist commented the Court needs to make a decision on whether or not to

close the lab first and if the decision is made not to close the lab the Court would give this proposal consideration. Judge Shaffer commented he envisions the Court making a decision at budget time. Dr. Mitchell was thanked for his time and for bringing the proposal to the Court and for his willingness to discuss the matter with the Court today. Commissioner Weimar commented from a farmers perspective malt barely is not an option in the County due to climate and canola requires more moisture than the County receives. Commissioner Weimar thanked Dr. Mitchell for the variety of potential revenue sources and stated he would like the lab to be an economic tool. Dr. Mitchell was thanked again for his time.

Judge Shaffer commented in his conversations with Economic Development Administration (EDA) they have stated a payback formula needs to be established considering assessment of building, the County being awarded a \$920,000 grant with conditions unmet, and the length in which the County has operated the building. EDA has not provided Judge Shaffer with the final payback option yet and has strongly encouraged the County to find a business to operate the lab. Commissioner Gronquist commented at the time EDA provides the County with a payback figure then the question needs to be asked of EDA what are the repayment options.

IN THE MATTER OF CORRESPONDENCE - CONTINUED

Acknowledged receipt of letter/report from Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) RE: 2013 Material Recovery Report. It was noted Gilliam County's total recovery rate in 2013 was 41.8%; the goal of 20% was met and exceeded. Gilliam County Planner Susie Anderson joined the discussion. Anderson commented the report summarizes recycle efforts. In response to question about meeting and surpassing benchmark Anderson commented the County has increased efforts to obtain better information from commercial haulers of scrap metal and Waste Management (WM) increased its disposal of metal containers. Anderson anticipates the recovery for 2014 to be down at around 25% as the last couple of years the recovery has been inflated by WM. In response to Commissioner Weimar, Anderson stated nothing happens to the County if the desired goal is not met. Anderson commented there is lack of incentive to recycle in the County as County residents can haul waste/recycle to WM directly for disposal at no cost. Judge Shaffer commented as a member of the Association of Oregon Counties (AOC) Energy, Environment and Land Use Committee he mentioned the introduction of Legislative Concept (LC) LC587 and LC588. Judge Shaffer referred to handout highlighting LC587 components including increase requirements for larger communities and those closer to Portland; other cities/counties will have more flexibility; updates local waste recovery goals and updates statewide goals. Judge Shaffer referred to handout highlighting LC588 components including increases statewide tipping fee; extends fee to special waste streams and authorizes smaller fee adjustments by rule. Judge Shaffer commented he is unsure of the legislative impact of the proposed increase in tipping fees. Commissioner Gronquist commented if the tipping increase was an issue the County would be hearing from WM and until or at which time that may take place it is a non-issue in his opinion. Judge Shaffer stated he has asked WM to weigh in on the matter as AOC is asking for support and would like to know more before pledging support.

Acknowledged receipt of letter from Klickitat Public Utility District (PUD) RE: Federal Energy Regulatory Commission project number 13333. It was prefaced the County sent a letter of support (November 2014) for the project and now the PUD is asking for a funding investment/commitment. Judge Shaffer commented this project could be instrumental to opening up the California power market. Judge Shaffer proposed inviting a PUD representative to a court meeting suggesting the month of February to provide more information; no objections.

IN THE MATTER OF OTHER – RE: COUNTY RESOLUTION. NO. 2003-18

County Planner Susie Anderson informed the Court that she has been notified today about a huge land purchase. There is potential for the new landowner to want a large number of partitions to take place. Anderson commented she is requesting permission to notify the new landowner (applicant) that the County will be requesting payment of County's cost in connection with potential land use application(s) including actual consulting cost. Anderson commented she would like to contact consultant Dan Meader about working on the potential partitions and per resolution inform the applicant up front of request that the applicant will cover all consulting fees. **Consensus** of the Court for Anderson to notify applicant of expectation of payment for consultant services up front.

IN THE MATTER OF COURT MEMBER REPORTS

Judge Shaffer announced the remodel project at the ESD building for 911 expansion is underway and unfortunately an issue with shutting the cooling system down and the backup did not respond resulted in damage to computer equipment. Commented union negotiations are scheduled to begin January 28, 2015.

IN THE MATTER OF WORK SESSION: CONTINUE FINANCIAL PLANNING DISCUSSION

Judge Shaffer using a projector referred to Excel worksheet(s) for information purposes only. A spreadsheet outlining funding priority categories and percentages set aside for those categories including livability/quality of life (45%), infrastructure (20%), economic development (20%) and strategic reserve (15%) over the next several years was reviewed. It was pointed out the first spreadsheet includes a cut of \$200,000 to the 2015-16 general fund balance, with the suggestion of utilizing the amount that was used to increase the contingency fund in the 2014-15 budget. Fiscal year 2016-17 includes a \$650,000 payoff of grain quality lab and \$1.5 million to either the Ardent Mills Building loan or the Arlington Community/Senior Center. Fiscal years 2017-18 and 2018-2019 include a \$100,000 cut to general fund, with the suggestion that this can be done by using the payments from Ardent Mills (\$100,000 to general fund and \$150,000 to the industrial park fund). Commissioner Gronquist commented he is in favor of building up the industrial park fund, once Ardent Mills building debt service is satisfied. Discussion took place on the suggestion of imposing a cap on the four funding priority categories. Page two of the handouts was reviewed noting it shows both the SIP Discretionary funds per category and the distribution of Economic Enhancement Funds for the next five years. The last two pages in the handouts suggest where projects from the strategic plan might be placed into the four categories.

Page three of the handout is a summary of the 2014-15 funding requests/budgeted allocations for entities that received a letter from the County Court. Discussion took place on how to Court should entertain request for the 2015-16 budget process. Discussion included should the Court send letters to the same entities, are there entities missing i.e. Summit Springs Village, placing a cap on funds available, five projects in the middle of the page have been funded out of the general fund and consideration should be given to move them to the discretionary funding discussion and of the entities listed where would the projects fall in the four funding categories.

In response to question the Court did not define the funding categories but rather at the work session in May examples of projects were suggested for each category; see below excerpt from May 1, 2014 minutes

Additional entities/projects identified that have already asked for a funding commitment from the County include Arlington TV Cooperative, Cottonwood State Canyon Park (information/experience center), and Gilliam County Soil Water Conservation District.

Commissioner Weimar inquired if along the lines of capping the funding categories is the intention of the Court to leave funds in each category for 'just in case' scenario; no response. Judge Shaffer commented the Court made the decision to 'bank' the SIP funds a year in advance so the exact figure is known and the County is not spending the funds as they are received. It was reiterated the first goal for the County is to take care of debt and then attempt to continue to fund those entities/projects that have historically received funds from the County but convey the message of 'holding the line.' Discussion continued on the idea of placing entities/projects into the four funding categories and at one point Commissioner Gronquist suggested combining all the funds into one large pot. Both Commissioner Weimar and Treasurer Hammer stated they were in favor of the categories. Discussion turned to how best to track the expenditures. Judge Shaffer stated he is in favor of holding a line with respect to funding entities this year. i.e. establishing a cap so the Court is able to offer a definitive answer of why an entity may not be funded at the requested level should that be the case. It was **agreed** to send letters to the entities that received a letter from the County Court for the 2014-15 budget process and to add the following to the list Summit Springs Village, Arlington TV Cooperative, Cottonwood Canyon State Park and Gilliam Soil Water Conservation District.

Arlington TV Cooperative grant match request discussion continued

The Arlington TV Cooperative made a previous request earlier in the day for grant match funds in the amount of \$150,000 for USDA grant. Judge Shaffer expressed concern that Frontier Telenet may be applying to the same program and the County is already financially invested in Frontier Telenet. Arlington TV Cooperative representative Alan Cunningham member of the audience commented the TV Co-Op wants to be the HUB. In response to question Cunningham stated if the Cooperative only received funding for the HUB phase of the project it would only be able to provide a vehicle to supply internet, no TV or phone service. Cunningham stated the TV Cooperative Board is committed to the fiber project and has received an influx in funds from the Port of Arlington to allow the Cooperative to get through to the end of the project. Cunningham reminded the Court that Frontier Telenet is the wholesaler the TV Coop is the retailer. Judge Shaffer stated his concern with ownership of the HUB. In response to Commissioner Gronquist question the current budget was consulted to determine where the \$150,000 grant match if approved would be allocated from. In reviewing the budget it was identified that \$87,000 in SIP discretionary (the difference in the amount allocated to Columbia Hills Manor and the payment being made to debt service could be used towards the grant match and the balance could come from economic development project development funds.

Motion by Commissioner Gronquist, seconded by Commissioner Weimar to supply a letter of commitment in the amount of \$150,000 as grant match to the Arlington TV Cooperative for USDA grant; if USDA grant is awarded County grant match to be disbursed this fiscal year. Shaffer – Yes; Gronquist – Yes; Weimar – Yes; **Motion carried.**

It is the understanding of the Court that Alan Cunningham and John Neys will oversee the project. Commissioner Gronquist suggested that Alan Cunningham will be the point of contact in dealing with the Arlington TV Cooperative moving forward.

In response to question about debt elimination it was pointed out the debt discussed earlier refers only to the loan for the Ardent Mills building. The County has additional debt service for the Frontier Telenet digital switch which is on a schedule to be paid in full in three years, adding there is no incentive to pay this debt off early.

IN THE MATTER OF CORRESPONDENCE – CONTINUED

Acknowledged for the record, email correspondence was received today from Les Ruark regarding topics on the agenda and Judge Shaffer will respond to the email.
